

Dr. Bruce Lincoln is the Caroline E. Haskell Distinguished Service Professor of the History of Religions in the Divinity School at The University of Chicago. His work emphasizes critical approaches to the study of religion, and he is particularly interested in issues of discourse, practice, power, conflict, and resistance. As such, his work has covered a vast range of topics including the theology of George W. Bush, pre-Christian Europe, and professional wrestling. His most recent publications include *Gods and Demons*, *Priests and Scholars: Critical Explorations in the History of*

Religions (Chicago, 2012); "Happiness for Mankind": Achaemenian Religion and the Imperial Project (Louvain, 2012); Between History and Myth: Stories of Harald Fairhair and the Founding of the State (2014); and Discourse and the Construction of Society: Comparative Studies of Myth, Ritual, and Classification, 2nd ed. (2014).
