Dr. Michael Muhammad Knight, University of Central Florida

Dr. Knight is an Associate Professor in the Department of Philosophy at UCF. His 2004 novel *The Taqwacores*, centering on a group of punk-rock Muslims, launched a cultural movement among young Muslims and led to the development of an actual Taqwacore genre of Islamic punk music. He published several other novels, books, and journalistic articles about American Islam before expanding his repertoire to include academic work as well. At UCF, he teaches courses such as World Religions; Moses, Jesus, and Muhammad; and Religion and Medicine.

Dr. Tracie Mahaffey, Florida State University

Dr. Mahaffey is a Senior Associate Teaching Faculty and Director of Undergraduate Studies in the Department of Philosophy at FSU. She is interested in the philosophy of action, specifically issues of autonomy and informed consent, teaching courses such as bioethics and the ethics of consent.
