## **Call for Papers**

This year's symposium will center on the theme: "Crisis and Calamity: the Aesthetics of Apocalypse, Immorality, and Conspiracy"

Given our current socio-political atmosphere, our 21st annual symposium seeks to explore questions surrounding times of crisis and calamity. We invite scholars to present papers concerning historical or current crises as they relate to religion. Previous symposia have featured scholars from various disciplines and departments. We therefore invite papers from fields as varied as History, Anthropology, Political Science, Literature, Philosophy, Religious Studies, and Classics.

David Frankfurter, Boston University, Professor of Religion; Aurelio Professor of the Appreciation of Scripture, will deliver this year's keynote address: *Conspiracy, Atrocity, and "Ritual"*

Presentations should be approximately 15 to 18 minutes in length and will receive faculty responses. In addition, respondents will select an outstanding graduate paper to receive the Leo F. Sandon Award, an endowed award named for the Religion Department's former Chair.
