### KEYNOTE SPEAKER

J. Kameron Carter is Associate Professor of Theology at Duke University Divinity School. He works in African diaspora studies using theological and religious studies concepts, philosophy and aesthetics, and increasingly poetry in doing so. Driving his work are questions pertaining to the theory and practice of blackness, with particular reference to black feminism and the question of the black maternal.



Professor Carter's book Race: A Theological Account appeared in 2008 (New York: Oxford UP). He is the editor of Religion and the Future of Blackness (a special issue of South Atlantic Quarterly, 2013) and presented the Warfield Lectures (a set of six lectures) at Princeton Theological Seminary (2016) under the title Dark Church: Experiments in Black Assemblage (forthcoming with Yale Press). He's also finalizing the manuscript of a book titled Beyond Ownership: A Blackpoetics of the Sacred. Professor Carter is a joint-curator with Professor Sarah Jane Cervenak (UNC, Greensboro) of a year-long project called "The Black Outdoors" (supported by Duke University's Franklin Humanities Institute) that thinks about blackness as an otherwise ecological condition.
